“Love, Legacy, and Imagination”

**A TRIBUTE TO BEVERLY JENKINS,
DETROIT’S QUEEN OF AFRICAN
AMERICAN ROMANCE**

**“I’m just a little colored girl
from the Eastside of Detroit,”**

says **Beverly Jenkins** modestly — a statement that belies her incredible legacy.

For over thirty years, Jenkins has been a literary force: an **NAACP Image Award** nominee, *USA Today* **Bestselling Author**, and the recipient of countless honors, including the **Romance Writers of America Nora Roberts Lifetime Achievement Award** and two **Career Achievement Awards** from *Romantic Times Magazine*.

When a young Beverly Jenkins from Detroit dreamed of working in a library, she never imagined she’d one day *write* the stories that would inspire generations of readers.

The Beyoncé of Romance

At a recent Black Book Festival, readers crowned Beverly Jenkins the “*Beyoncé of Romance*” — greeting her with a long, thunderous standing ovation that filled the room. It was a moment of well-deserved recognition; as one attendee put it, “It was beautiful to see Beverly receive her flowers personally.”

Jenkins has touched millions with her stories of Black love and perseverance. When asked who she hopes her stories will reach, her answer was immediate and heartfelt:

“Young Black women. I want them to see the possibilities, to recognize the shoulders they’re standing on, and to understand that none of us got here on our own. Someone bent over and did that work every day, opening doors for us. I want them to be proud — of who they are, of their beauty, no matter their skin tone, shape, or size.”

Amazingly, she is now reaching her fourth generation of readers — proof that her words have become timeless.

From Cass Tech to Classic Love Stories

Born in Detroit, a Cass Tech graduate, Jenkins began writing romance novels that focused on 19th century African American life, which was often overlooked in mainstream fiction.

Her first novel, *Night Song*, was published in 1994, marking the start of a career that would change the landscape of romance literature. Since then, she has authored more than 30 novels, skillfully blending historical accuracy with emotional depth to illuminate African American life in the 19th century.

Her books celebrate resilience, community, and joy — all through the lens of love.

The Spark That Started It All

When asked how it all began, Jenkins explained that her inspiration came from the absence of stories that reflected real Black love.

“Love is love. And one of the great things about romance is that it’s finally starting to represent who loves — to plant that flag that love is love. You’re entitled to love, no matter how you identify. That’s one of the best things about this genre. But people still discount it. People don’t always see the connection between these stories and their own lives — and that’s kind of sad.”

For Jenkins, representation isn’t optional — it’s revolutionary.

Love and Joy as Acts of Resistance

When I asked Beverly to talk about how, even in the hardest times, her characters — and the people of those eras — still found love, she reflected deeply:

“It’s like redemption all over again. Redemption was that period after Reconstruction when the people who tore the country apart were given back their land and power.

Love was so important because it grounded you. It gave you something to come home to — to soothe and heal you. If we hadn’t had love, we wouldn’t be here. If we hadn’t found joy with each other, we wouldn’t be here.

In spite of the Klan laws and all the hardships, we still built colleges. We still had babies, christenings, baptisms, and birthday parties. Look at the Gilded Age — we still had balls! And even when we didn’t, we had the juke joints, rent parties, and concerts.

There’s no amusement white people had that Black people didn’t have too — gambling boats, parks, vacation places. The only thing we didn’t have was the Ku Klux Klan, and they can keep that.” [laughs]

“We’ve survived for over 200 years by holding onto joy — even when the world is crazy. When nobody wanted to listen to us, we still found joy with each other.”

A Message to Detroit’s Dreamers

When I asked Beverly what she would say to a young girl in Detroit who dreams of writing romance but feels hopeless, she didn’t hesitate.

“Write it. They are not the boss of you. You can write whatever you want.

Open yourself up to life so you can gain the experiences you’ll need as you grow. Don’t be afraid to say yes. Don’t be afraid to say no. Life is about the journey, not the destination.

And I know growing up in Detroit, it feels like everything begins and ends here — but it doesn’t. If you get the chance to see other places, take it. Whether it’s going away to school or joining the military — even though I don’t really promote that — some people have found good lives that way.

Most importantly: write and read. Read everything. Not just romance — all genres. That’s how you learn your voice, build your vocabulary, and understand other people and places.

I read every book in the Mark Twain Library — from the kiddie books to the romances to the adult ones. Then I moved downtown to the branch by Crowley’s — what’s now the Skillman Library. We just called it ‘the library next to Crowley’s,’ across from Hudson’s.

Don’t be afraid to do things, see things, read about things. Life is amazing. Who would’ve thought I’d be here — from St. Mary’s Episcopal Church on Canfield, Jones Elementary on Celesta, Barbour Junior High, and Cass Tech? It’s all good.”

Success Beyond Lists

When I asked her what it feels like knowing her stories have touched so many souls, Beverly smiled.

“You listen to their stories, and it helps you measure success. The fact that I can touch people in ways that have nothing to do with *The New York Times* list or with movies — that’s the real gift.

Sure, we’d love to have movie deals, but I’m not going to stop writing because no one’s adapting my books.

Years ago, one of my readers said her grandson had to do a Black History report, and the teacher asked where he got his information. He said, ‘My grandmama’s Ms. Bev books.’

When you educate a woman, you educate a race. Somebody smarter than me said that — but it’s true. And I still sit here thinking, *Me? Little colored girl from the east side of Detroit?* I’m grateful every single day.”

Her humility, humor, and brilliance make her not only a literary icon but also a living example of perseverance and grace.

The Heart of Her Legacy

Beverly Jenkins has woven *true Black history* through her romance stories — uplifting the African American experience while redefining the genre itself. She has broken barriers, opened doors, and proven that love stories set in Black life and

history belong in the center of American literature.

As I reflect on our conversation, one quote from Robespierre comes to mind:

“The secret to freedom lies in educating people, whereas the secret to tyranny is in keeping them ignorant.”

Through her words, Jenkins continues to educate, enlighten, and empower — one story, one reader, one generation at a time.

Final Thoughts

Books built her world. Imagination fueled her dreams. Now, Beverly Jenkins’s words have built worlds for others to believe in — worlds that uplift African American history, break glass ceilings, and give voice to love in a world that once stood silent.

To know and honor this woman through this article is an honor for me. And I leave you with a quote from Beverly Jenkins to hold close to your heart:

“Everything we have in this world started in someone’s imagination. Books show us what’s possible — and sometimes, you can’t imagine being what you can’t see.”

Love in Black and Black:

A BRIEF HISTORY OF BLACK ROMANCE

In a recent article from Refinery29, journalist Taryn Finley asserts, “As more Black women join book clubs and profess their love for romance novels on social media, it has become very clear that the demand for literature that depicts Black women as desirable, autonomous and fulfilled in their romantic lives is sky-high.”¹ This joyful sentiment that Black romance is finally having its moment, is not new. Since Black romance novels began to appear on bookshelves it seems that every few years – if not every few months online – someone “discovers” that Black romance authors exist, marvels at what they have found, but rarely looks back to all that has come before. The hidden-in-plain site nature of African American romance history reflects a decades-long problem in the romance genre itself.

From nearly its inception in the U.S., romance had a race problem, which has obscured much of the groundbreaking work of Black women, on and off the page. In her dissertation on African American romance, Jamee Nicole Pritchard notes that much of this history still lives in “clips from newspaper and magazine articles, digitized author interviews from YouTube, writing manuals authored by African American writers in the late 1990s and early 2000s, and one-off chapters that briefly discuss the rise of multicultural romance, lumping together all novels written by, about, and for people of color.”² The ephemeral nature of this history, literally and figuratively, has meant that the history of Black romance has been passed down from one author to another, one reader or librarian to another, largely absent from most mainstream discussions of the genre, but there are breadcrumbs.

In June 1980, Dell, an imprint of Doubleday, published *Entwined Destinies* by Rosalind Welles under their new dedicated romance line, Candlelight. The book was edited by Vivian Stephens and written by journalist Elsie B. Washington under a pen name. It was also the first Black romance, meaning that the author and all characters in the relationship were Black, published by a major romance press. Besides the fact that both characters were African American, *Entwined Destinies* was unremarkable, a classic romance story following Kathy Godwin, a young reporter in London, and oil tycoon, Lloyd Craig. The hero fights his attraction but still manages to steal

the heroine away for steamy kisses as they fall in love in less than two hundred pages. But its importance lies squarely in that same unremarkability. Together, Welles and Stephens crafted a story that fit neatly into a genre that was so oppressively white it would take another decade and a half for the genre to build on their groundbreaking work. The pervasive beliefs that Black authors could not meet the literary standards of romance, that Black characters did not fall in love the way white people did, and that Black readers did not read romance has persisted so strongly that forty-five years after Welles' debut, publishing is still surprised to find a large and ravenous audience for Black romances.

One of the best ways to enter Black romance is to take it out of the, at times, cloistered space of the romance genre – replete with its own language and origin myths that are entirely white – and connect it to other, more familiar, threads of Black literature. In *Black Love Matters: Real Talk on Romance, Being Seen, and Happily Ever Afters*, Beverly Jenkins, the prolific Detroit-based romance author, begins the story of African American romance in slave narratives, as “the first

instrument used by African Americans to tell their own stories.”³ In narratives as disparate as *Incidents in the Life of a Slave Girl*, the *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass*, and *Running a Thousand Miles to Freedom*, formerly enslaved people told of the horrors of slavery alongside the loving bonds that made the hope for freedom possible. After the Civil War, as Black people tested the bounds of their tenuous freedom, that possibility turned into a kernel of hope that exemplified for Jenkins the true definition of a happy ever after (HEA).⁴ Jenkins has penned over thirty Black romances set all over the United States and in the Caribbean, in time periods from the American Revolution to the present – but primarily in the Reconstruction Era – because love, whether romantic, familial, or friendship, has always been a strong thread through Black literature. From Toni Morrison’s literary fiction to Lorraine Hansberry’s plays, Terry McMillan’s women’s fiction, Eric Jerome Dickey’s contemporary fiction, and Zane’s erotica, African Americans have been writing fiction about love for at least a century and a half.

Officially, the romance genre began in England in the 1930s with Mills & Boon novels for women. Harlequin distributed these stories in the United States and Canada, all written by white authors with white, British characters. After some pressure from the American audience for American stories, Avon published *The Flame and the Flower* by Kathleen E. Woodiwiss in 1972, another white romance by a white author. In the mythic origins of the romance genre, many scholars and readers often tell a story that leads back all the way to the Greeks. The truth of this lineage is less important than the assertion that one can make a similar mythos for Black romance.

Jenkins, and others, often call back to Frances Ellen Watkins Harper’s *Iola Leroy or Shadows Uplifted* (1892) as the first Black romance. Harper’s story is a sentimental, late-Nineteenth Century novel about a range of social issues – slavery and freedom, race, miscegenation, and temperance – but the relationship between Iola and Dr. Frank Latimer is “the first novel by a Black author to portray the love story (with a happy ending!) of two Black protagonists.”⁵ Similarly, even as Zora Neale Hurston’s *Their Eyes Were Watching God* (1937) has much more to say about Black autonomy and women’s lives in a patriarchal society, readers over many decades have been swept away by Janie and Teacake’s tragic love story. And in 1969, Signet released Rubie Saunders’ *Marilyn Morgan, R.N.*, making it the first book with Black characters published by a Black author for their Nurse Romance line.⁶ None of these books are traditional romances by the standards of late-Twentieth Century definitions – which require a central love story that ends in a HEA – but they provide an important foundation upon which Welles, Stephens, and so many other authors and editors built.

Love (can't)

It is hard to imagine that Black romance would exist as it does today without the intrepid leadership of Vivian Stephens. Beginning in 1978, as an editor at Dell, Stephens attempted to push back at the stuffy British roots of the genre and “began looking for writers who could create female characters of substance,” rather than “helpless heroines” and “ninnies.”⁷ Stephens’ focus on creating a modern heroine for the American market also coincided with a diversifying of the genre in other respects. Besides recruiting Washington to write *Entwined Destinies*, she also launched the careers of Mexican American author Marisa de Zavala and indigenous author Jean Hager, to write “ethnic romances,” and developed writing workshops for aspiring authors of color, pushing at the whiteness that defined the genre at the time. Stephens also helped found the Romance Writers of America (RWA) in 1980, eventually rose to editor-in-chief at Dell, before leaving for Harlequin in 1983, and being laid off in 1984. After this, she became an agent and book packager, working with Rochelle Alers, Shirley Hailstock, and Beverly Jenkins.⁸

While there were a few standalone Black romances published throughout the 1980s, including Sandra Kitt’s *Adam and Eva* (Harlequin, 1985), the 1990s proved to be a lively playground for Black romance. Later coined “The Summer of Black Love,” in 1994, sixteen Black romances were published across four publishers, giving Black readers ample opportunity to see themselves in romance. *Night Song* (Avon) by Beverly Jenkins was a historical romance set in the aftermath of the Civil War, in the all-Black town of Nicodemus, Kansas. Sandra Kitt’s *Serenade* (Arabesque) was a second chance romance between a jazz singer and the musician who stole her heart ten years prior. Donna Hill’s *Temptation* was a sexy romantic suspense about a wealthy widow in pursuit of answers about her husband’s death as she falls for a mysterious stranger. Joining Hill, Jenkins, and Kitt were authors like Eboni Snoe (*Beguiled*, Arabesque), Shirley Hailstock (*Whispers of Love*, Arabesque), and Margie Walker (*A Sweet Refrain*, Arabesque) and while some of their names have faded from popular memory, their books remain in the personal collections of many Black readers. Pritchard argues that “Black romance appealed to Black readers because it pushed against the traditional romance formula...depicted love in all sizes, shapes, and skin tones and reflected Black communities throughout the Black Diaspora,” and one can see much of that broad appeal in 1994.⁹

The 1990s were the perfect moment for this boom in Black romance. In her analysis of Genesis Press, a small, family-owned, Black romance press targeting Black readers, Ann Yvonne White outlines this moment in literary history. “The 1989 publication of Terry McMillan’s *Disappearing Acts* marked a new step, appealing to a readership broader than the usual highbrowed literary book buyers. *Disappearing Acts* proved an unusual commercial success among African American readers. McMillan’s third book, *Waiting to Exhale*, released in 1992, made the *New York Times* bestseller list and stayed there for 38 weeks.”¹⁰ Outside of literature, Black filmmakers like Spike Lee, Julie Dash, John Singleton, Kasi Lemmons and others were releasing films that spoke to the breadth of Black life – love and pain, northern, southern, and western, rural and urban. And while the rise of Hip Hop has often dominated discussions of Black music in the decade, R&B – songs about love, heartbreak, grief, and joy – was just as dominant on the radio airwaves. The long-held belief in publishing that Black people didn’t read – especially not about love – couldn’t hold water in a culture dominated by Black artists reading, writing, and singing, about exactly that. But bigotry has no logic and the demand for Black romances did not manage to dislodge the dismissal of Black readers.

Efforts to diversify romance and make room for authors and characters of color were, on some level, aimed at appealing to a presumed white audience. The prevailing belief in publishing then, as now, was that books by Black authors had to have “crossover appeal,” because Black readers were an insignificant population for marketing. However, in conversation with scholar Judy Moody-Freeman for the Black Romance Podcast in 2022, Sandra Kitt discusses Vivian Stephens’ feelings about Black readers. “Even in the late 70s and early 80s, she knew there was an audience of Black readers out there who were reading these books by the millions, and they were reading them happily because what they were involved in was the romance of the story. The he and she meeting and coming together – that was the attraction. But she understood and was trying to be the forerunner in letting the industry know that if you write stories with Black characters, you will really draw in a whole other audience that you’ve been ignoring.”¹¹ Still, the belief that a Black romance needed to appeal to a largely, or primarily, white readership, held back the development of Black romances, especially when it intersected with the rigid structure of the genre.

In her study of Harlequin Mills & Boon romances, independent scholar Laura Vivanco notes that each of the publisher’s lines came with “its own guidelines which provides details about elements such as

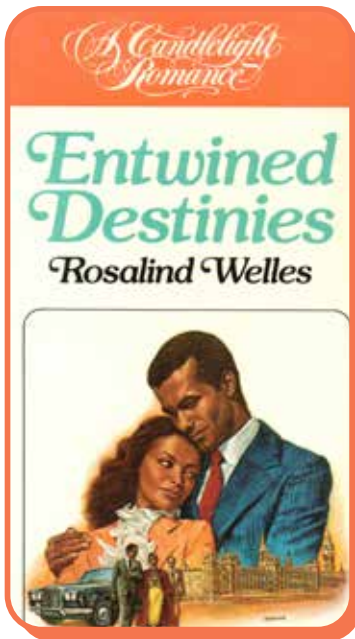

settings, levels of explicit sexual reference, and plot, which distinguish it from other lines... These guidelines, then, serve as detailed descriptions of the constraints within which authors must work."¹² This is most easily seen in the economic conformity of many romances from the early 1970s through the 1990s. As scholar and historical fiction/romance novelist Piper Huguley has suggested of historical romances, the expectation that the romance hero be wealthy has often worked to write Black men out of that role. "What is the [Black] hero doing for a profession? And is it good enough? Valid enough?... Not just financially secure, it's gotta be the jackpot kind of economic situation... You cannot possibly have a Black man doing financially well historically speaking."¹³ In Huguley's assessment, Black historical romances suffered from a belief that there were either too few Black men of means historically or that a working-class hero would disrupt the fantasy necessary for an escapist romance. Even in contemporary romances, a publisher's stronghold on its brand could narrow the bounds of the author's creativity. For this reason, most Black men in romance have been wealthy, educated, middle class or better, or absent.



Take for instance Harlequin's popular *Texas Cattleman's Club* series. This long-running series of category-length romances began in August 1999 with Dixie Browning's *Texas Millionaire*. Originally imagined as a series about five wealthy bachelors, it eventually spawned over one hundred and forty books spread over numerous miniseries, written by dozens of authors. Black authors like Brenda Jackson, Yahrah St. John, and Nadine Gonzalez who have contributed to the series have had to fit their Black characters into a mold that privileged white readers – and editors' – expectations of what love, romance, and intimacy looked like. But not all publishers took this path.

Of the sixteen books published during the "Summer of Black Love," twelve came from Kensington's Pinnacle/Arabesque line. The Arabesque imprint published books written by Black authors, with Black characters, and for Black readers. "Unlike Dell and Harlequin, Pinnacle Books was not concerned with crossover appeal and followed the lead of Black independent publishers in marketing solely to Black readers. This is the difference between the 1980's ethnic romances and the Black romances that launched in 1994."¹⁴ Scholar Ann Yvonne White agreed: "What made the 1992 season different was the rise of authors writing for African American readers first and white readers only incidentally."¹⁵

While some argue that there are no material differences between Black romances and their white counterparts, many suggest that the differences can be stark when you know what to look for. In her discussion of Black historical romances, Rita B. Dandridge argues, “While romantic fiction may seem to avoid the political realm entirely, black women’s historical romances actually take strong political positions.”¹⁶ In her text, Dandridge argues that Black authors imbue the tropes, structure, and even the HEA with a political sentiment absent from mainstream romance. For instance, in her discussion of Jenkins’ historical romance set in pre-Civil War Michigan on the Underground Railroad, *Indigo*, Dandridge argues that the HEA for Hester and Galen was not simply their union, the birth of a free-born child, or even the return of Hester’s enslaved mother. In Dandridge’s assertion, their HEA could only come at slavery’s end.¹⁷ Taking cues from Dandridge’s work, I have argued elsewhere that Alyssa Cole’s self-published historical romance novellas follow a similar structure. In *Be Not Afraid* (2016), Cole tells the story of Kate and Elijah who meet on either side of the American Revolution. Their HEA revolves around their freedom after the war, but is also encapsulated in a later novella, *That Could Be Enough* (2017), which tells the story of Kate and Elijah’s granddaughter, Andromeda, a free-born, queer woman, who finds love and community on her own terms. These novellas illustrate that the HEA as freedom is communal and multi-generational.¹⁸

In a similar vein, Carole V. Bell argues that “while Black romances often hinge on universally popular tropes like fake dating, fated mates, friends to lovers, enemies to lovers, and second chances, many authors take these universal tropes and make them new by grounding them in culturally specific Black experience. Situated in predominantly Black contexts, the world-building around Black community and institutions can be just as essential to these stories as the romantic trope.”¹⁹ In her essay, Bell considers Black entrepreneurship and economic independence in Alexandria House’s *Let Me Free You* (Self-Published, 2018), but it was also apparent in earlier books as well, including Margie Walker’s *Love Signals* (Marron Publishers, 1990), where the couple meets at an anti-apartheid concert. These works illustrate that culturally specific romances can become a winning strategy for publishing success.

Behind the scenes at Kensington’s Arabesque, Black editors and other professionals cultivated new generations of Black romance and women’s fiction authors for waiting readers. Keeping in close contact

with Black bookstores, book clubs, and industry professionals, editors like Monica Harris, pushed back at the idea that there was no market for Black romances, one book at a time. As Sandra Kitt, Arabesque's first signed author, remembered, "Other authors were writing and submitting novels, but no one was buying them... Once Arabesque came along, if you were an African American writing fiction, you knew you could submit your work to them. Our work had a home."²⁰ In the age of FUBU (For Us By Us), Kensington built Arabesque into a trusted line of books by, about, and for Black women. Over the next four years, Arabesque launched the writing careers of dozens of authors and then sold the line to Black Entertainment Television (BET) Holdings in 1998. BET developed two new lines, Sepia (interracial romances) and New Spirit (inspirational), before selling the lot to Harlequin in 2005 where Arabesque became Kimani before shuttering in 2017. Through its many iterations and publishers, Arabesque was one of all too few spaces in mainstream romance publishing where Black authors, characters, and readers had a home, as Kitt suggested.

But mainstream romance has never been the entirety of the romance story. Small, independent publishers and self-published authors have long made a way out of no way to tell the stories of their hearts. Pritchard noted that Arabesque didn't emerge out of nowhere. "The success of Black indie romance novels proved that Black readers wanted a genre of their own."²¹ While most mainstream romance publishers were skeptical of Black authors, dismissive of Black readers, and sought to constrain the breadth of Black characters, Black publishers and writers had no such hang-ups to overcome.

Genesis Press was founded in 1993 in Columbus, Mississippi by William and Dorothy Colom, "two local attorneys who realized that there was an untapped market for African American romance fiction...and began publishing African American romances in trade paperback under the Indigo romance imprint," later expanding to erotica and interracial romances.²² White calls Genesis a "stepping stone" for authors who would go on to have long careers like Donna Hill, Rochelle Alers, and Seressia Glass to name a few. A bootstrap, family-owned press, Genesis understood at inception what many other publishers still refuse to accept: Black readers wanted to see themselves and their romantic lives on the page and they were willing to pay for the pleasure. And if mainstream publishers wouldn't give it to them, they would go to the source.

While not technically a part of the “Summer of Black Love,” E. Lynn Harris’ *Invisible Life* is included here as part of that broader Black literary thrust in the ‘90s of books centered on Black life, relationships, and love. Originally self-published, the 1994 release was a traditionally published reissue. Throughout his career, Harris cultivated a dedicated fanbase of Black women and queer men who became fans of characters who looked and sounded like them. “There wasn’t a beauty salon, soul food restaurant, or someone’s living room where people didn’t congregate and talk about E. Lynn’s books.”²³ Harris was but one of a number of Black authors who got their start self-publishing in the 1990s and that tradition has remained strong in romance.

One might assume that after the “Summer of Black Love,” publishers scrambled to find more Black authors to satiate a neglected Black readership, but the reality was more of the same. While a few authors found sustainable success in romance writing, such as Brenda Jackson’s long career with Harlequin and Beverly Jenkins’ thirty-year career primarily with Avon, many of the Black romance authors who debuted in the 1980s and 1990s left the genre or fiction writing entirely, citing poor sales and a lack of publisher support as part of the reason.²⁴ Since the early 2000s, online writing and publishing sites have proved fruitful for romance authors locked out of traditional publishing or wishing to avoid it entirely.

Diverse Black authors such as Alyssa Cole, Talia Hibbert, and Kennedy Ryan either got their start self-publishing or had significant periods self-publishing their books. While authors like Christina C. Jones, Nicole Falls, and Alexandria House have chosen self-publishing as a parallel path, seeking to cultivate a direct relationship with a readership they already knew existed. In the years since the collapse of Harlequin’s Kimani line, some previously traditionally published authors such as Sherelle Green, Elle Wright, and Reese Ryan have turned to self-publishing, entirely or occasionally, to begin a new phase of their careers. Pritchard notes that “for every 100 books published by the leading romance publishers in 2020, only twelve books were written by people of color... In response to the racial and ethnic diversity gap in romance publishing, writers of color have turned to self-publishing and independent presses for visibility within the market.”²⁵ Thus, self-publishing has provided a unique space for telling stories traditional publishing continues to marginalize.

In the late 2000s and 2010s, publishing professionals and readers alike often looked down their noses at self-published books for lack of editing, uninspired covers, and poor writing among other issues. Authors of all races, genders, and sexualities have been criticized for taking the supposedly easy way out by self-publishing. But many self-published authors and their dedicated

readers see the move as avoiding the gatekeepers of traditional romance, most of whom have never been, and are not, Black. For instance, Tasha L. Harrison's *Truth Duet* series, which tackles the unique position of an African American police officer at the birth of Black Lives Matter, was self-published long before the 2020 reckoning over racism in romance, which came in the wake of both the collapse of RWA (Romance Writers of America) and the murder of George Floyd.²⁶ In Bim Adewunmi's essay for BuzzFeed News discussing Alyssa Cole's Civil War spy trilogy, the *Loyal League*, Adewunmi notes the unique context of the series. "The company has forged a chain uncommon in mainstream publishing: an unbroken line of black women, from the novel's protagonist, via the author, to the editor, to the art director who created the cover art (featuring a black woman). This was a 'black on all sides' mainstream publishing project."²⁷ While this leaves out Cole's agent and other stakeholders, Adewunmi's point stands. In a publishing world dominated by white agents, editors, art directors, and booksellers, Black books must inevitably move through white hands. The languages Black people used to speak to one another – whether it be AAVE (African American Vernacular English) or colloquialisms – must on some level be translated for an audience unfamiliar with Black rhythms and blues and loves. Some authors translate that well, while others refuse that

out of hand. As Christina C. Jones noted of her own decade-long career, self-publishing gave her "the freedom of giving exactly what I want to the world, when I want to give it. My only limits and deadlines are self-imposed, which means I have very few lines to color inside."²⁸ Elizabeth Held notes that "digital self-publishing allowed a certain democratization of publishing to take place. Traditional publishers vastly underestimated the appetite of readers for romance of all kinds, of all subgenres, for diverse characters, for a wider variety of tropes and more. There was just so

much freedom in self-publishing,” and traditional publishing has taken note.²⁹ In recent years, scores of self-published authors have entered traditional publishing off the strength of their work and reader word-of-mouth, such as Danielle Allen and Chencia C. Higgins. In the 2010s, when editors still recommended that Black authors make their male love interest white, self-publishing allowed Black authors to tell their stories, their way.

Jamee Nicole Pritchard argues that “Black romance does not fit into the traditional structure of white romance, and the constant comparison of Blackness to the norms of whiteness creates limitations in the exploration of Black culture,” a guiding principle of this essay.³⁰ Black romance authors have a rich history that is still being written, one declaration of love at a time.

Discover 50 Years of Black Romance

Explore more than 50 years of Black Romance! This selection covers some of the most important authors and titles of the genre, but there is also plenty more to explore at your local Detroit Public Library location.

Many early romance novels written by Black authors have become hard to find, mostly because they weren't printed in large numbers. These books are not currently in the Detroit Public Library collection, but that doesn't make them any less important to know about.

Marilyn Morgan, R.N. by Rubie Saunders (1969): This book was the first time a Black author had written Black characters for a romance publisher.

Entwined Destinies by Rosalind Welles (1980): Welles was the pen name of journalist Elsie B. Washington, who was recruited by Dell's Candlelight Romance editor Vivian Stephens to write this book, the first Black romance of the romance novel boom of the late 1970s and 80s.

A Toast To Love by Barbara Stephens (1984): Veronica Mixon at Doubleday recruited several Black authors to write for the publisher's Starlight Romance line. This title was the first Black romance to be published in hardcover.

Looks Are Deceiving by Maggie Ferguson (1994): The pen name of attorney Anita Williams, this book was the first romantic suspense by a

Black author to be published by romance giant Harlequin.

Luckily, the Detroit Public Library has a massive collection of Black romances to choose from, including some of its most important authors.

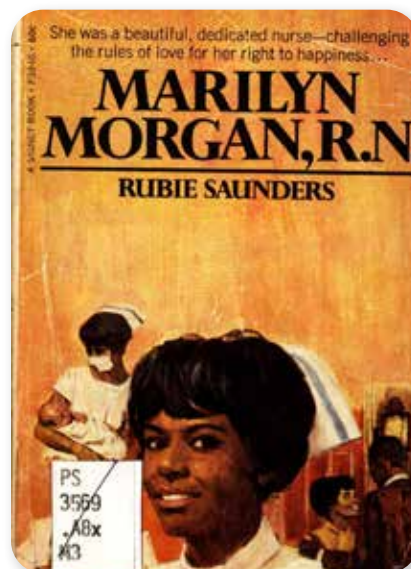
Iola Leroy, or Shadows Uplifted by Frances E.W. Harper (1892): Though it isn't a romance novel, this book, one of the earliest novels to be published by a Black woman, includes the earliest instance of a Black couple, Iola and Frank, having a happily ever after.

Adam and Eva by Sandra Kitt (1985): The first Harlequin romance by a Black author with Black characters.

Rooms of the Heart by Donna Hill (1990): Hill's first novel, published by short-lived influential independent publisher Odyssey Books.

Someone to Love Me by Francis Ray (1992): Originally titled ***Forever Yours***, Francis Ray's debut was also published by Odyssey.

Love Signals by Margie Walker (1990): Walker's first novel, published by independent Marron Books.



1994 was a landmark year for Black romance, called by many “The Summer of Black Love,” with more Black authors appearing in bookstores than any previous year. Most of those books are in DPL’s collection:
